

(Preparation Tasks for the) Unit Task

Step 4:

Present your interviews

The interviewer should give the short biographical profile first. Record your podcast interviews with your mobile phone OR have them in a written form.

2 Conducting an interview: Daniel's Do-it-yourself Diner

Sarah: Hi Daniel. Thanks for inviting me to your diner today.

Daniel: Hey Sarah. Thanks for coming.

Sarah: I love the decorating in here. It makes me feel so at home. Did you do it yourself?

Daniel: Well, you might think so since that's the name of my diner, but I'm not very good at

decorating so some of my friends helped me. They did it themselves.

Sarah: I read that there's a story behind the name. What does the name of your diner mean

Daniel: It means two things actually. I'll start with the easy one. You can really do a lot of things in my diner by yourself. I have a menu, but I also have a list of ingredients. That means that you can 'design' your own pizza, or sandwich or pasta dish.

Sarah: So I tell you what I want on my pizza and then you make it for me?

Daniel: Yes, or you make it yourself.

Sarah: But don't you think that can cause problems? Am I really allowed to do that?

Daniel: Well, I can't have 15 people in the kitchen at the same time and I have to keep everything very clean. But one guest can come back and help cook for their table. And if you help, your meal is cheaper.

Sarah: What kind of food do you specialize in?

Daniel: New York food.

Sarah: Can you explain that to me?

Daniel: Not really. Can you tell me what a New Yorker is?

Sarah: Not really.

Daniel: The food in my diner is a mix of a lot of different styles. Just like New Yorkers.

Sarah: How long have you had your do-it-yourself diner?

Daniel: That question actually brings me to the second reason that my diner has the name it does. I've had my diner for about 20 years. When I came to New York, I wanted to be an actor like a lot of young people. But instead I worked in a diner and found out that I really loved it.

Sarah: What did you love about it? It's a lot different than acting on stage.

Daniel: Not really. On stage you interact with the other actors and the audience and in the diner I interact with my customers. My diner can be my stage.

Sarah: But why a do-it-yourself diner?

Daniel: Because in New York if you want your dreams to come true, you have to do it all yourself. You can't depend on other people. And so I made my diner dream come true all by myself.

Sarah: And you never dream about being a stage actor anymore?

Daniel: No, I don't. See all of these pictures on the wall? They're some of my customers.

Their dreams have come true and many of them are famous now.

Sarah: How many celebrities have worked here?

Daniel: Hundreds have worked or eaten here. They did it all themselves.

Sarah: So what are your goals for the next 20 years?

Daniel: To keep doing it all myself and help others do it themselves too.

Sarah: Thanks, Daniel, I enjoyed talking to you.

Do step two of the Unit task (write a short biographical profile of the person you have chosen). You can write about a person that's only real in your imagination or about a real person. This writing task is also your homework (Keep in mind that you have to send me the Unit task when you have finished all steps (either as podcast or in written form). Alicia Corden has been living in New York City since her birth. Her parents are famous celebrities: Her dad Brad is a rock star and her mother's family has ships, hotels and a baseball team. She has acted in a couple of movies and has recorded some songs.

Alicia and her family lives in one of the most important blocks in Manhattan, which has a great view. She likes partying and normally goes to parties with many other rich and famous people three or four nights a week. In her holidays she likes to go to her family's private island near the coast of Mexico or to their castle in Scotland.

Alicia loves to spend money- last year she gave her dog \$50 bottles of water from a mountain in Africa. And she is a shopping addict- she goes shopping in the most expensive stores in Manhattan and has a personal shopping assistant who pays her bills and carries her bags and a personal driver.

If you have no idea who should be the person you want to write about, it could be Brett Conti (The YouTuber was born in United States on June 21, 1992. Skateboarder and businessman who co-founded the skateboard company Fortune Skateboards. He is famous for his videos about skating, entrepreneurship and other subjects on his YouTube channel, which currently boasts over 150,000 subscribers.).
